WHAT CAN YOU

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UMAIR'S LOVE FOR ISLAM

Umair ibn waggas wanted to join the Muslims fight their enemies. He was not really old enough, but when he saw his older brother Saad preparing his camels and armour he could not resist the urge to go along and help defend Islam.

The unbelievers in Makka did not want a strong community which obeyed the one and only God Allah. They where determined to destroy the new faith of Islam which was growing stronger every day. The unbelievers in Makka where always looking for an excuse to attack the new Muslim community in Medina. They found just the excuse they wanted when Abu Sufyan chief of the Quraish was leading a caravan of 1,000 camels, bringing valuable goods back to Makka from Suria.

Abu Sufyan sent a message to Makka saying that they where under attack, and needed help. The Makkans quickly mustered 1,000 men and marched on to Medina. Although the people of Medina could only raise 313 poorly armed Muslims, they decided to set of towards Makka to face the Makkan army before it reached Medina.

Saad was one of that small group of believers. And hidden among the marchers was his younger brother Umair. Umair knew fully well the prophet did not allow young boys to fight with the Muslim army. But praying that he would not be spotted before the battle began he took his sword and slipped in quietly amongst the soldiers.

When the Army halted it was Saad, who noticed the anxious looking Umair. "What are you doing here? Why are you hiding like this?" He asked. "I want to fight for Allah", explained Umair. "I love Allah and his blessed prophet so much, that I am quite willing to die for Islam, but if the blessed prophet catches sight of me, I know he will send me back home. He will say I am too young. I have to fight without him knowing I am here." Saad left Umair where he was.

Just as Umair had feared the blessed prophet noticed him as he was lining up his soldiers. He told Umair that he was too young to fight and that he would be sent back home to safety.

When the blessed prophet had walked away Umair bursted into tears. He was heartbroken. His sobs attracted the attention of some soldiers who where standing nearby. They went to the prophet, and upon hearing how distressed Umair had been because of his decision, the Blessed Prophet remained silent for a few minutes, then with a smile he granted Umair permission to join the Muslim army.

THE CRESENT MOON?

- The adoption of the crescent moon (with or without a star) is a relatively modern tradition. In Mohammad's time, Muslims did not have a collective symbol as such, usually carrying either the flags of their tribe, or a simple coloured flag.
- It is thought that the crescent may have been adopted by Muslims after they secured Istanbul (Constantinople) in the 1400's. The city used the crescent moon as their flag, and this was then taken by the invading Muslim force as a token of Allah's approval.
- Since then, the symbol has been used in the flags of many nations that are either officially Muslim (e.g. Turkey and Pakistan) or have a large Muslim population.
- The use of the star has been explained as a representation of the five pillars of Islam; however, not every country uses a star in its flag, and not all stars used are five-pointed.
- The first sight of a crescent moon is used as the traditional start point for many celebrations and holidays in Islam, such as the official start of Ramadan. It may be that this has reinforced its use as a symbol for all Islam.
- The symbol (above) that is generally used to represent Islam is called the Chand Sitara.

For we are the same, only different in some ways, in our belief in one God.




A few of my favourite titles in the series are:



TIGER

Easily recognized by its coat of reddish-orange with dark stripes, the tiger is the largest wild cat in the world. The big cat weighs up to 800 pounds (363 kilograms), stretches 6 feet (2 meters) long, and has a 3-foot- (1-meter-) long tail. The powerful predator generally hunts alone, able to bring down prey such as deer and antelope.

Tigers wait until dark to hunt. Once a tiger has spotted its prey, it sneaks as close as possible to its victim. Then the tiger sprints to the unsuspecting animal, usually pulling it off its feet with its teeth and claws. If the prey animal is large, the tiger bites its throat to kill it; smaller prey is usually killed when the tiger breaks its neck.

Tigers have been known to eat up to 60 pounds (27 kilograms) of meat in one night, but more often they consume about 12 pounds (5 kilograms) during a meal. It may take days for a tiger to finish eating its kill. The cat eats until it's full, and then covers the carcass with leaves and dirt. When it's hungry again, the tiger comes back to feed some more, until the meat is gone.

Unlike most members of the cat family, tigers seem to enjoy water. They swim well and often soak in streams or pools of water to cool off.

Some tigers live where it gets very cold—in parts of North Korea, eastern Russia, and China. Other tigers live where the climate is generally warmer—in India and parts of southeast Asia. The whole species is endangered throughout its range. Tigers have been over hunted for their fur as well as for other body parts that many people use in traditional medicines. Tigers' habitat has also dwindled seriously as humans have developed land for uses such as farming and logging.
